

Hand Under Hand Guidance

Hands are very important for a learner who is deaf-blind. They provide a means of gathering information and interacting with the world. They help a learner participate in activities, stimulate curiosity, and independence.

Using a Hand under Hand approach is a non-intrusive way to support a learner to explore and use their hands rather than taking the learner's hands and moving them through an action or activity.

Supporting a learner using a Hand Under Hand approach includes:

- Inviting a learner to put their hands-on top of your hands to feel what you are doing or grasp an object. Slowly rotate your hands so the learner is introduced to the object or activity.
- Bring an activity or object up and under a learner's hands.
- Gradually withdraw your hands until the learner's fingers touch the object being explored.
- If a learner withdraws their hands, continue to do what you are doing and reinvite the learner to participate.
